

ETHICS FOR RETIRING PASTORS AND THOSE REPLACING THEM Responsibilities of the Retiring Pastor

With more retiring pastors owning homes within the community of their last pastorate, careful attention must be given to the church's well-being and that of the new pastor called to serve that church. With this concern in mind, the region, in cooperation with the Commission on the Ministry and Ministers Council, sets forth the following as Regional Policy regarding this matter.

- 1. In keeping with the National Ministers Council Code of Ethics and the policies of the region, upon retirement, a pastor severs all pastoral ties with those previously served. This includes weddings, funerals, pastoral calls and visits, giving advice and counsel, and in any way continuing the previous pastoral relationships. This also involves attending church functions and services until an agreement can be made with the new pastor. Continuing ties of friendship is one thing; pastoral ties is another.
- 2. If remaining within the community last served, the retiring pastor will not attend the church previously served for a period of at least six months to one year following the retirement. Visits following that period will be at the invitation of the Interim Minister or the new pastor. Participation in weddings and funerals should be by invitation of the Interim Minister or new pastor. Persons not associated with the church should be encouraged to form a relationship with the church and its Interim Minister or new pastor.
- 3. Once the new pastor is in place, the relationship between the new pastor and the former pastor with the church she/he formerly served can be worked out. If a satisfactory and workable agreement cannot be reached between them, they may wish to consult with the Area Minister or Executive Minister.

[Next Applicable section]

7. Whenever a pastor is to remain within the community of a church just served, their relationship to that church, its Interim Minister, and it's newly called pastor shall be evaluated with the well-being of that church in mind. What evolves as a working relationship must give first priority to the needs of the church. Individuals' needs are important but must not take priority. The relationship of former pastor, Interim Minister and new pastor must reflect the needs of the church.

You may be wondering what comes next. Pastor Paul's last service will be April 18th and then he will be considered officially retired. I hope to keep you in the loop as we move through these next steps together as a congregation.

Who will preach after Paul leaves?

At our last Deacon's meeting we decided on the type of interim we thought would serve us best during our search for a new pastor. We decided to pursue an intentional interim. That is an Interim Minister who is specially trained to help guide us through this transitional process. Until we hire the intentional interim we will be having a variety of Pastors and Lay Ministers who will fill the pulpit. The Worship Commission has started the process of filling the pulpit each Sunday until such a time the Interim Minister is hired.

What will we do about funerals, weddings or sick visits?

The Interim we are looking for will pick up those responsibilities once they are hired. In the meantime if there is a need that arises please communicate that with the church office and we will help find a Pastor or Lay Minister who can fill in.

What about looking for a new Minister?

At the last Deacon's meeting we decided to move forward with forming the Search committee. The Search Committee is a dedicated group of 5 or so church members who will meet regularly in person or by Zoom to work through the process of finding the right Pastor for our church. Pulpit/Search Committees should consist of a good cross section of our congregation. It is a 12-18 month commitment. The members of the committee will work through a process including a self-study that is provided by the American Baptist Churches of New York State. This process helps us identify our values, needs and vision for our church and helps to match us with appropriate candidates. The Search committee's work is confidential but regular updates will be provided.

Who is on the Search committee?

Good question! We are looking for interested church members to serve on the Search Committee. It is a 12-18 month commitment to meet either in person or by Zoom. (See more details above) As we collect names, we will be nominating a group that reflects the diversity of our congregation.

The names of those selected will be voted on at our April board meeting and presented to the congregation for a vote at a congregational meeting held after church on Sunday April 25th. Your interest in serving could lead to this or a number of other tasks and committees that will be needed throughout this transitional period. So keep your heart and ears open for more opportunities to help.

American Baptist Churches USA Mission and History

ABCUSA is one of the most diverse Christian organizations with approximately 5,000 local congregations comprised of 1.3 million members throughout the United States and Puerto Rico. Its history of involvement with Burma (Myanmar today) dates back 200 years, when Ann and Adoniram Judson, the first American missionaries landed in the port of Rangoon on July 13, 1813. The Judsons and other early missionaries introduced Christianity to the Burmese, Chin, Karen, Kachin, Shan and many other ethnic groups of Burma. As a result of the American Baptist mission work, Baptists constitute the largest Christian organization in Myanmar, currently numbering nearly 1.4 million members in 17 Baptist Conventions. The Myanmar Baptist Convention (MBC) based in Rangoon is the umbrella organization with oversight to the Conventions. Christians in Myanmar have produced the largest number of religious workers among their own people. International Ministries (IM), ABCUSA's global ministries organization, continues its support to MBC and related Baptist churches through relief and development, educational scholarships, theological training, church development, and medical work in the country. American Baptists Home Mission Societies (ABHMS), the domestic ministries organization of ABCUSA, has sponsored nearly 120,000 world refugees with its partner organization, Church World Service (CWS), since after World War II through its office of immigration and refugees.

In the spring of 2007, the national Burma Refugees Task Force (BRTF) was initiated in response to the influx of Burma refugees. The name was changed to the Burma Refugee Commission (BRC) in 2014. There are 80,000 Burma refugee immigrants who are now affiliated with ABCUSA and live across 130 cities and towns, urban and suburban areas. These Burma "diaspora" communities and churches are working closely with ABCUSA and with their respective conventions to advocate for the concerns of those in Myanmar suffering from human rights and religious freedom violations. They also raise funds to assist their vulnerable families and ethnic communities in Myanmar, in refugee camps in Thailand, and displaced people in Malaysia and India.
